For 60 years, lifelong community supporter **Betsy Wood Willey** (EGRHS class of '64) has been giving back. A former teacher and author, Betsy was a co-founder of the Leadership and Youth Development program at East Grand Rapids High School. She has served as President of both the Mary Free Bed Guild and the EGRHS PTSA, served on the boards of Universal Health Solutions, Camp Newaygo, and Arts in Motion, and for more than 20 years, Betsy led students and adults into the wilderness of the Boundary Waters of Minnesota. As a lifelong environmentalist, activist, and teacher, Betsy educates others on climate change and the degradation of the earth. As a community leader, Betsy models activism, wisdom, caring, integrity, and wholeheartedness as she brings out the best in those she mentors.

Bill Spindle (EGRHS class of '81) has covered some of the most pressing issues of our time during his more than 30 years as a leading journalist. For more than two decades, he worked for the Wall Street Journal, based in Tokyo, New York, Rome, Dubai, and New Delhi while reporting from more than 30 countries from Latin America to China. He's worked for Newsday and Bloomberg News, and his work has appeared in The Atlantic, Fortune, and the New York Review of Books. Bill was also part of the leadership team that established The National, a newspaper in the United Arab Emirates. For the last several years, Bill has written about climate and energy, first as an international affairs fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations, then at Semafor, and now as senior global correspondent for Cipher by Breakthrough Energy.

A Virtual Cup of Coffee with Betsy Willey '64

I have great memories of getting Rose's caramel corn when that was all they offered but my favorite is Jersey Junction! It is unchanged after all these years and I still am enjoying it with grandkids.

What was your path from East Grand Rapids to where you are now in life? I graduated from U-M in 1968, majoring in English & History with a teaching certificate. I taught middle school in Livonia, MI while my husband, Larry, attended U-M Law School. After law school, we lived in Chicago with our young son, Dave, and then moved to Hawaii for a glorious year. Our daughter, Sarah, was born there. The next move was to Washington DC for six years during a very interesting time - Watergate. We moved back to Grand Rapids in 1978 to be closer to my mother. I started taking classes to renew my teaching certificate and our son, Dan, was born. When Coach Barcheski was in the hospital, I took over his classes and then stayed on at the high school for 11 years teaching English, Social Studies and Leadership classes. My career path changed in 2000 when I became certified in Healing Touch and received a certificate in spiritual direction from The Dominican Center. Since then, I have enjoyed teaching classes in interfaith spirituality and leading retreats using my book, *Footprints of the Soul, A Creative Guide For Spiritual Journey Groups and Individuals*.

What specific thing did you learn in East that has enabled you to be successful?

I grew up in a neighborhood with lots of kids and parents who created a supportive community. When my father died suddenly when I was four, the neighborhood surrounded my family with love and support. I learned how important it is to create community in many ways and this formed my way of being in the world. I still have several groups I enjoy facilitating.

What were you like in school?

In elementary school, I was very shy and quiet but had a few close friends at Lakeside who are still connected and important to me. Even though there were no women's sports at the high school, I had a positive experience through various clubs and student council.

Did you have a favorite teacher or class?

Shirley Menninga for senior English. She inspired me to major in English and become a teacher.

If you had to choose one moment in one location to serve as the signature moment of your East school experience, what would it be?

Being the first senior class to attend our new high school. We spent the first three years of high school at Wealthy Elementary and I have lots of fun memories of dances in that gym and swim meets in the old pool.

What do you know now that you wish you'd known then?

How important and formative my growing up years in East were. When I left for college, I thought I would not come back but from an older perspective, I appreciate our beautiful community. I also wish I'd been more exposed to the rich diversity of the world. When I taught at East, I sponsored the Multicultural Youth Ambassadors and we interacted with students from all over the Grand Rapids area. We attended a PeaceJam International Conference in Denver and heard from the Dalai Lama and Desmond Tutu.

Do you stay in touch with many people from East Grand Rapids?

Yes, our class has had great reunions and we're planning our 60th for next year. Several of us have stayed close through the years.

What advice do you have for young East alums who are just starting out?

Stay in touch with friends & find ways to contribute to your community.
