

# What was your path from East Grand Rapids to where you are now in life?

Being passionately relational, I was destined for sales/marketing and business. Being entrepreneurial from an early age, I needed independence and no limits on possible growth. I entered the financial services business in 1978 and used my midwest work ethic to propel me to success. There has been a sea of change that has been constant for the last 45 years and I have been fortunate to ride that wave. It has allowed me to impact lots of people as they have faced critical crossroads in their lives and have developed plans for their future. As a professional Financial Advisor, I have been fortunate to land in a career I continue to be passionate about. In 1980, my wife and I moved to the San Francisco Bay Area to build my business. In 1999, we bought a second home in GR and built a small clientele. Have bounced back and forth ever since.

# What specific thing did you learn in East that has enabled you to be successful?

The culture in EGR taught me to want to strive to get better. For a lot of people, it was to get better academically. For me, it was motivation to have options as I grew up and got older. My parents were uneducated immigrants. We had five kids in our family. It was all my parents could do to keep food on the table and keep us in the EGR school system. That was their goal—keep us in the EGR schools. They were successful at that but we were on our own. I wanted everything my friends had and was fortunately forced to generate my own income to pull it off.

# Did you have a favorite teacher or class?

I really liked Carl Nestor, my math teacher and former coach. I loved my wrestling coach, Dave Dozeman, and still see him today.

# What were you like in school?


School days were busy for me. Wrestling and Cross Country were my two sports. When I wasn't doing that, I had 2-3 jobs at a time to generate spending money and money to make investments. Being passionately relational, I had lots of friends and enjoyed my classmates. Many are still close friends.

# If you had to choose one moment in one location to serve as the signature moment of your East school experience, what would it be?

I loved wrestling. I wasn't that good at it but loved the sport and loved being around it. One time, a handful of kids on the team were talking about going to a wrestling camp in the summer for a week at MSU. They asked if I was going. I told them I would love to go but there was no way I could afford something like that. They asked if my parents would pay. I let them know I wouldn't even be asking because I knew they just could not afford those types of luxuries. The next day, I came to school and two of the guys (they were brothers) came to me and said my tuition had been paid by their parents. No questions asked, no repayment necessary. I was floored and could not believe I was going. I vowed that day to put myself in the position to be able to do that when I got older. Paying it forward. That's one reason I am a big supporter of the Jimmy Gerken Fund to help families that are challenged financially. It allows kids to fully live the EGR experience.

# Do you stay in touch with many people from East Grand Rapids?

Our class (1971) is very active. Our reunions are large and 1-2 times a year, we have a get together that 20-40 of us gather for. Yes, our close class stays in touch. As we are aging, these relationships that we share our upbringing with are more valuable than ever. Most of us have been battered and bruised by life along the way. Sicknesses, financial challenges, dysfunctional families and all. Throughout all of that, we share our roots and cherish each chance we have to reconnect with classmates of the past.



# What do you know now that you wish you'd known then?

EGR is an amazing place. Students and parents need to covet the opportunity to be there and be as involved as they can in the community. By participating and giving back, not only does the community benefit but the individual gains so much more.

# What advice do you have for young East alums who are just starting out?

Stay close to your classmates. These may end up being cherished relationships for the rest of your life. Stay connected and learn to give back. Being part of the EGR Schools Foundation is a small way you can do something. Contribute to the Jimmy Gerken Fund and help some family with some of the essentials of staying in the community. Start with a small amount. You can build on it over time.

# Kindergarten Purposeful Play, Part of Foundation's Record-Breaking Year

A dollhouse, a mini kitchen, baby dolls — they might seem like toys to most, but to Norah Knoerl's kindergartners at Breton Downs Elementary, they're so much more.

On a mid-December day, the dollhouse served as a much-needed housing upgrade for students Wilson Koontz, Willa Mileskiewicz and Olivia Oates.

"We're playing that we're in New York and this is our house," Wilson said as he and his classmates fluttered around the dollhouse play area. "We had to move from Michigan because our house in Michigan was too small."

A relocation of that magnitude would take a lot of work, but the students are making sure they sneak in some fun, too.

"We're going to see a Taylor Swift concert," Wilson belted excitedly. Then he added even more detail: The show starts at 4 a.m., he said, and popcorn is involved. Oh, and they'll all have 3D glasses, "so Taylor Swift will walk right up to us. Not for real, just because of the glasses."

This multi-layered play scenario took shape in Wilson's imagination thanks to an \$18,000 grant from the East Grand Rapids Schools Foundation. The grant funded new play equipment for kindergarten classrooms at each of the three East Grand Rapids elementary schools. The funding was part of the foundation's record-breaking fall grant round.

While Wilson and his crew were cavorting in the Big Apple, elsewhere in Knoerl's class, Knox Watson, Josh Eizinger and Nora Sulisz transformed a newly refurbished kitchen play area into a holiday bakery. "The kids have real bowls and spoons and whisks so they can pretend that they're making cookies in there," Knoerl said.

Students do everything from "cooking" to filling pretend orders. "I'm paying the money we're collecting from the people who want cookies and hot chocolate," said Josh from behind a brightly colored register. The prices were steep, though. "I just paid \$589 million for gingerbread cookies," Knoerl joked after a brief haggle with Josh.

In another corner of her classroom, Lillyana Nuñez and Mia Lahnsteiner enjoyed hosting a picnic with brand-new baby dolls.





# **Dramatic Play**

It's all about dramatic play, Knoerl said, which involves pretending, imagining and exploring. While dramatic play can be a subset of purposeful play, which has a specific goal to educate, it doesn't necessarily need to be, Knoerl said. It's more about letting kids be kids.

"It's being thoughtful about what the kids are working on as they're playing, which is a huge part of kindergarten," she said. "It's valuable because they work on their language skills, they work on looking at other perspectives and other points of view, they work on working together."

Knoerl said students have been immensely appreciative of the new equipment. "They love it," she said, adding that the kitchen area is a favorite that's used every single day.

# Play Supported by Foundation, District

The EGR Schools Foundation grant originated with Knoerl, but it grew into a collaborative effort to get supplies for each of the district's elementary schools. When she saw how "loved" the play equipment was in her classroom, she worked with other EGR teachers to secure funding for upgrades.

Knoerl said she's grateful that the foundation saw the value of dramatic and purposeful play. "Unfortunately, there are a lot of kindergartens in the state that don't allow for play time, and it's such a huge, important part of the child's development," she said.

She's also thankful that the district's administrators still value play, and that the EGR community rallied behind the effort to support it through the grant.

Since then, she has served on the development committee and the grants committee. "I enjoyed the grant committee and the discussions we had about each grant application. A lot of thought, consideration and research goes into each grant request before the committee makes any recommendations. I am always impressed with the creative and innovative ideas our staff and students propose to improve the student experiences for our school community," she shared.

She says her favorite grants can be divided into two types. First, the ones that seem so simple but make a big difference. For example, this past grant cycle the Foundation funded an \$18,000 grant for new pretend kitchen play equipment for kindergarten classrooms at each elementary school.

"The teachers and students were so excited to replace their much loved and worn out play kitchens and doll houses with new items for dramatic play. It is a pleasure to be able to support something that seems so simple but has a huge impact on the development of our youngest students," she says.

The second type of grant she loves are the creative ones that provide something extra to the student experience at East. The Foundation funded a fight choreographer to teach the members of the drama club how to execute fight scenes with fake weapons for a high school play. "The student enthusiasm for these types of grants is just amazing," Jenny says.


# 2024 Community Service & Distinguished Alumni Awards Dinner October 16, 2024 Watermark Country Club
